The Mission of the Open Door Center

The Mission Statement of the Open Door Center is Excellence in serving people with disabilities by: Respecting dignity and rights, providing opportunity for growth and fostering independence. Two main themes that outline the practicing of the mission statement are Universal Enhancement and Positive Behavior Supports.

Marc Gould, an earlier practitioner and author of Universal Enhancement, implores us to focus on the importance and impact of the effects of our behavior on improving the quality of the lives of the people we support. For most of us, quality of life is defined in meaningful relationships with family, friends, co-workers and others in our life circle. Employment, education, spirituality, "giving to others" are other important aspects of life. Possessing things of meaning and value further enhances our quality of life. The vision of Universal Enhancement is to support people with disabilities to realize their quality of life outcomes, the same quality of life outcomes that we value. It challenges us to realize that everyone has desires and dreams. They may differ greatly from our own (or may not) but nevertheless, they are important to the person we support. Perhaps the needed change in philosophy, that philosophy advocated by Universal Enhancement is best described in this poem written by Dr. Gould:

OH, WHAT A BEAUTIFUL MORNING

If you could only know me for who I am
Instead of for whom I am not,
There would be so much more to see
"Cause there's so much more that I've got.

So long as you see me as Handicapped Which supposedly means something, I guess There is nothing that you or I could ever do To make me a Human success.

Someday you'll know that tests aren't built
To let me stand next to you.
By the way you test me, all they can do
Is make me look bad through and through.

And someday soon I'll get my chance When some of you finally adapt You'll be delighted to know that though I'm disabled, I'm not at all handicapped.



A second theme related to the Center's mission is through the training of Positive Behavior Supports. It reveals the need to change our interactions with others; co-workers, family members, friends, especially with those we support. It is all in the approach. Is our approach one of encouragement or discouragement? Most of us do not relish the idea of being the recipient of correction, the implication that we are doing wrong. Positive Behavior Supports encourages us to take time to reflect on our actions. Have we forgotten to question our own actions before reflecting on those of others? Are criticism and judgement our approach for patience and the opportunity to be supportive to others? Is reflecting criticism patience, and the opportunity to follow the more positive road? To quote Haim Ginott in his poem "I Am the Decisive Element: "It's my personal approach that creates the climate; it's my daily mood that makes the weather. I possess a tremendous power to make an individual's life miserable or joyous. I can be a tool of torture or an instrument of inspiration; I can humiliate or humor, hurt or heal. In all situations it is my response that decides the outcome." What are you doing to be a person of joy rather than misery? Next time reflect on your words before you act. Choose the positive avenue.




